EXTREMISM AND MILITANCY: A CHALLENGE TO NATIONAL SECURITY

Your Excellencies, Distinguished guests, Speakers and Conference participants, Ladies and gentlemen,

Let me begin by expressing my heartfelt gratitude and congratulating the Malaysian Institute of Defence and Security (MiDAS) for organising this conference, aimed to broaden the base for knowledge and awareness on the serious issue of Extremism, Militancy and Radicalism that is proving to be a big challenge to our national security and stability. I believe our sessions today were able to highlight the alarming rate on the spread of extremism and radical ideologies. If gone unchecked it may destroy the very foundation of our nation state. Here, we are not short of examples of a broken society and state directly attributed by extremism and radicalisation. I sincerely hope and believe that this kind of forum should be held continuously to spread the message that Malaysia is against any acts of extremism and militancy. As I speak, our government security mechanism is keeping watch of certain quarters that are spreading online urging its followers to carry out attacks on key assets and public areas in Malaysia. Hence I agree with the speakers and reiterate that militant ideologies and radicalisms must be removed from our society. We owe this responsibility to our next and future generations.

We must also acknowledge and accept the fact that no one organisation can combat and neutralise the threat posed by extremism and militancy alone. The dynamism of the security landscape in the face of terrorism, militancy and radicalisation if not addressed will cause havoc to a state's society.

Ladies and Gentlemen,

To sum-up, in the face of these security threats, the rich diversity, tolerance and trust amongst all of us Malaysians, should remain true at the core of our being. Diversity should be complemented with inclusivity, the resolve to live harmoniously and a common vision of national unity. The concept of One Malaysia as propagated by YAB Prime Minister Najib Tun Razak hits the nail as its emphasis is on prosperity and respect for diversity.

I agree with the distinguish speakers that reiterated the importance of the relationship between the state and its citizens and vice versa. It is about the role of individuals and communities. It can be concluded that as a moderate Malaysia, we have to adapt initiatives to counter terrorism responses that include counter-radicalisation and strategies that focus on soft approaches. These soft approaches should include engagement through media, cultural, educational and religious forums, with the aim of highlighting the realities of life under the IS. This will serve to dissuade individuals from internalising extremism messages advocated by extremist groups like the IS.

I have no doubts that this conference had provided both an informal and unofficial platform for each of us, individual or unit to take back and to refine our strategies and actions so as to make Malaysia a more stable and prosperous nation.

Finally, I would like to take this opportunity to express my sincere appreciation and kudos to Leftenant General Dato' Azizan Md Delin and his team at MiDAS for their efforts in convening this conference. I have fond memories of this conference, having pioneered the formation of MiDAS as a Defence Minister then and its subsequent activities such as the MiDAS Conference. Let me extend my deep gratitude to the distinguished moderators and speakers for their commitment in sharing their knowledge, experiences and thoughts. To all the participants, I also thank you and hope that the lessons that we take away today will be utilised for the benefit of the nation in strengthening national resilience and security as a leading agenda.
